Goads And Nails

Eccl. 12:9-14

> Introduction

- o In the KJV and ASV, the word "duty" is italicized showing that it has been supplied by the translators.
 - The text tells us that the "whole" of man is to fear God and keep his commandments.
 - When this is not a part of our lives, then the most important aspect of our lives is missing.
 - Luke 2:52 details four dimensions of human life:
 - And Jesus increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man. (mental, physical, spiritual, social)
 - With the spiritual missing, we are grievously incapacitated. (cf. I Cor. 13:2-3)

Ecclesiastes -- The Book

- The theme: The fear of the Lord (cf. Prov. 1:7; 9:10; Ps. 17:4)
- The perspective: Takes a long hard look at man's circumstances "under the sun" and moves from a valley of despair to the high ground of faith in God and reverence for his word. A vacuum that only he can fill. (Eccl. 3:11)
- o The source of the Preacher's words: (12:10-11; Ps. 80:1)
- The search for meaning: Who am I? Why am I here? What should I be doing to fulfill my purpose? (1:12; 2:3)
- o The experience shared: Chapter 2:1-18
 - Life tested. (1:13; 2:1ff)
 - Life detested. (2:17-18)
 - Life without God in view.

Goads and Nails

- Eccl. 12:11 → "The words of the wise are as goads and nails fastened by masters of assemblies, which are given from one shepherd."
 - Goads → sharp stick used to get an animal moving. To provoke to thought and action.
 Delivers a sharp sting driving into a desired path.
 - Nails → Hold things together; God's words nail down truth and give us absolutes on which to hold.
- Things don't last, but people will.
 - "Better is a handful with quietness than both hand full with travail and vexation of spirit."
 (4:6)
 - "Take heed and beware of covetousness: for a man's life consisteth no in the abundance of the thing which he possesseth." (Lk. 12:15)
 - "For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out. (I Tim. 6:7)
 - Give me...make me...Lk. 15:11,19
- People need others and everyone needs God.
 - 8 There is one alone, and there is not a second; yea, he hath neither child nor brother: yet is there no end of all his labor; neither is his eye satisfied with riches; neither saith he, For whom do I labor, and bereave my soul of good? This is also vanity, yea, it is a sore travail.
 - 9 Two are better than one; because they have a good reward for their labor. 10 For if they fall, the one will lift up his fellow: but woe to him that is alone when he falleth; for he hath not another to help him up. 11 Again, if two lie together, then they have heat: but how can one be warm alone? 12 And if one prevail against him, two shall withstand him; and a threefold cord is not quickly broken.
 - God has made us as social beings to relate, love, care, communicate with, and seek the best for others: (Gen. 2:18; Acts 2:42-46; I Cor. 12:25-26; Phil. 2:4; Rom. 14:7; Heb. 13:5-6)
- Spiritual growth is often accompanied by pain.
 - "A merry spirit doeth good like a medicine." (Prov. 17:22; 15:15)

- "Sorrow is better than laughter: for by the sadness of the countenance the heart is made better." (Eccl. 7:3) "sober reflection is good for the heart..." (NET)
- That which produces some of the greatest growth and stability as our lives go forward, can be very painful at a given moment in time. (Heb. 12:11; James 1:2-4)
- o Choices have consequences.
 - "Because sentence against an evil work is not executed speedily, therefore the heart of the sons of men is fully set in them to do evil." (8:11)
 - "If you think you can get something for nothing in this life, you just haven't got the bill yet."
 - Gal. $6:7-8 \rightarrow 7$ Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. 8 For he that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap life everlasting. (Num. 32:23)

> The Conclusion

o 9 Rejoice, O young man, in thy youth; and let thy heart cheer thee in the days of thy youth, and walk in the ways of thine heart, and in the sight of thine eyes: but know thou, that for all these things God will bring thee into judgment. 10 Therefore remove sorrow from thy heart, and put away evil from thy flesh: for childhood and youth are vanity. 1 Remember now thy Creator in the days of thy youth, while the evil days come not, nor the years draw nigh, when thou shalt say, I have no pleasure in them...13 Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter: Fear God, and keep his commandments: for this is the whole duty of man. 14 For God shall bring every work into judgment, with every secret thing, whether it be good, or whether it be evil.
